

#### **Rain Gardens:**

A rain garden is a depressed area in the landscape that collects rain water from a roof, driveway or street and allows it to soak into the ground. Planted with grasses and flowering perennials, rain gardens can be a cost effective and beautiful way to reduce runoff from your property. Rain gardens can also help filter out pollutants in runoff and provide food and shelter for butterflies, song birds and other wildlife.



### **Rain Barrel:**

Rain barrels collect free rainwater to water gardens, trees, and lawns and even wash cars, which can save on your water bill. They also help limit stormwater runoff pollution and erosion by diverting water. Installing a rain barrel is one of the easiest ways to reduce your household's water footprint and help keep our streams and other waterways clean. The average American family uses more than 300 gallons of water per day at home. A single 55-gallon rain barrel can save up to 1,300 gallons of water every year.

New Castle County offers a spring and fall discount rain barrel sale through the Clean Stream Champion

program. The only requirements are that you live in New Castle County and you've pledged to be a Clean Stream Champion!
